The Republican Plan for Medicaid Will Harm Washington

<u>Apple Health</u> is the state's Medicaid program. More than <u>1.8</u> million Washingtonians rely on Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

Republican Cuts to Medicaid Put Washingtonians' Health and Coverage At-Risk

Every proposal on the Republican <u>wish list</u> of more than \$2 trillion in Medicaid cuts is bad news for Washingtonians. Medicaid cuts would harm children, older adults, and families, ripping away their health care access and coverage. Republican Medicaid cuts would:

Cut Care for Children. Around 38% of children in Washington are enrolled in Medicaid or CHIP. Around 39% of kids with special health care needs, such as a physical or behavioral disability, rely on Medicaid in Washington. Cuts would disproportionately hurt children with the lowest incomes and the highest health care needs.

Block Access for Pregnant Women and Newborns. Nearly 28,300 births (35%) in
Washington per year are covered by Medicaid.
A cut to Medicaid would prevent mothers and babies from getting the care they need.

Increase Disparities for Communities of Color. Around 50% of children and adults with Medicaid in Washington are people of color. A decrease in Medicaid funding would reduce access for the communities that need it the most.

Curb Health Care Access for People with Disabilities. Medicaid covers nearly 350,000 people with a disability in Washington. Only 34% receive Supplemental Security Income,

meaning many do not qualify for Medicaid on the basis of their disability and could be subject to Republican policies like work reporting. People with disabilities often depend on Medicaid for services in order to thrive in their communities.

Create Barriers to Behavioral Health
Services. Nearly 150,000 Medicaid
beneficiaries were treated for a substance use
disorder in Washington in 2021. Medicaid cuts
and eligibility restrictions threaten lifesaving
treatment for people with behavioral health
needs.

Cut Coverage for Medicare Beneficiaries.

More than <u>221,000</u> dually-eligible Washingtonians rely on Medicaid to help pay their Medicare premiums and co-pays. For these enrollees, a cut to Medicaid is a cut to Medicare.

Disrupt Nursing Home Care. Cuts to Medicaid could disrupt care for <u>59</u>% of nursing home residents in Washington who use Medicaid to pay for care in a nursing home.

Bottom Line:

Republican proposals to cut Medicaid will result in Washingtonians losing Medicaid coverage—and there is no acceptable coverage loss. No Medicaid cuts to Washingtonians to fund tax handouts to billionaires.
